## **MOTHS FOR BEGINNERS : PART 4**

## **COMMON DAY-FLYING MACROMOTHS**

While a small number of common macromoths fly in daylight, often in sunshine, others can be disturbed from vegetation by day. Many of the latter will normally fly at sunset or dusk.

Carpets, Pugs and allies A number of relatively common Carpet and Pug moths can be disturbed by day. Other Geometers	Lesser Treble- bar*** (easily disturbed by day May-June and Aug-Sept)	Chimney Sweeper (flies by day June- July)	Latticed Heath (active by day May-June and July-Sept)	Brown Silver-line (easily disturbed by day May-June)
	Brimstone Moth (easily disturbed by day April-Oct)	Speckled Yellow (flies by day mid May-late June)	Common Heath (flies by day May- June)	
Hawkmoths, Tussocks and Tigers	Hummingbird Hawk-moth (immigrant flies by day Apr-Dec but mostly Aug- Sept)	Vapourer (flies by day July- Oct)	Muslin Moth (female active by day May-early June)	Ruby Tiger (active by day mid Apr- June and mid July-early Sept)

	Scarlet Tiger (active by day June-July)	Cinnabar (active by day mid May- early Aug)		
Darts, Brocades and allies	True Lover's Knot (active by day June-Aug)	Beautiful Yellow Underwing (flies in sunshine late Apr-Aug)	Antler Moth (flies by day mid July-mid Sept)	
<u>Arches, Minors</u> and allies	Cloaked Minor (flies by day late July-early Sept)	Dusky Sallow (at rest by day on flowers late July- early Sept)		
Other Noctuids	Silver Y (immigrant active by day May-Sept)	Mother Shipton (flies in sunshine early May-early July)	Burnet Companion (flies by day mid May-early July)	Straw Dot (easily disturbed by day June-July)

\*There are two very similar species - the Five-spot Burnet and the more common Narrow-bordered Five-spot Burnet (see Field Guide).

\*\*It is difficult to distinguish the Red Twin-spot Carpet from the red form of the Dark-barred Twinspot Carpet, now rare in our area (see Introduction: '<u>Online identification resources'</u>)

\*\*\* There are two very similar species – the Treble-bar and the slightly smaller Lesser Treble-bar (see Field Guide).
