


Number of sightings - 2018

The total number of sightings was down compared to the previous year with 167 sightings from 96 visits (compared with 377 from 101 visits for the year 2017). Nearly half the Purple Emperor sightings for 2018 were reported from Bernwood Forest (73/167). This may be a reflection of both the number of specimens in this area and the popularity of this forest with recorders. There were 20 separate reports from this site alone.


Data from the UKBMS website indicates little change nationally in Purple Emperor sightings between 2017 and 2018.

Obtaining accurate population numbers for this butterfly is particularly challenging given its liking for forest canopies, so drawing significant conclusions about its population variations from year to year is probably unwise.

The distribution throughout the three counties in 2018 is shown below with 38 separate locations having a sighting of only a single insect.



There were a number of new locations in 2018 of sightings compared to the period 2009-2017 – the vast majority of these being sightings of a single insect. Many of these are close to existing populations. Further work will be done in 2019 to determine how established these potential new colonies are.




Weather

The weather in 2018 was a mixture of extremes with the 'Beast from The East' arriving in late February bringing sub-zero temperatures and snow to southern counties. This was followed by further snow in mid- March. The summer was characterised by a long hot dry spell during June and July, which covered the main flight period of the Purple Emperor.

Flight period for 2018

The flight period for 2018 shows the number of sightings peaked quite sharply during the weeks beginning the 24th June and 1st of July.
